Homelessness Sunday - 5 October 2025

Homelessness Sunday is an annual event organised by Housing Justice, where churches and communities across the UK come together to raise awareness, reflect, and take action to address homelessness. It is marked on the Sunday before World Homeless Day on 10 October. This seeks to promote good ideas and share what's been achieved. It also advocates for improved policies and funding that can prevent and end homelessness.

The Methodist Church Housing and Homelessness Group are seeking to play their part in guiding the Methodist Church and the part Methodists can play nationally to end homelessness.

In July, the Methodist Conference in Telford agreed to the memorial proposed by this group. In part it said:

- (i) that genuinely affordable homes and emergency accommodation is an integral part of the mission of The Methodist Church as a sign of the gospel of Jesus Christ and as an outworking of our commitment to be a justice seeking church.
- (ii) The Conference strongly encourages Methodist people to consider what more they can do to tackle the housing and homelessness crisis in their area.

At Kingswinford we continue to support our local hostel - Saltbrook Place, Lye. We send an Aldi voucher each month to support their Wednesday 'Tea and Toast' get together. On 3 September myself, Linda and Judith went and served bacon sandwiches, toast, fruit, and hot drinks. They were also treated to a selection of home baked cakes, thanks to Judith and Linda.

We were working on one small grill and at times had quite a queue. Jamie, Paul, and Richard were amongst a number patiently waiting while we caught up on the backlog of orders.



Linda braved the heat of the grill; Judith was on the pass, and I filled in with drinks and other bits. The residents and staff really appreciated it. Dean said, 'these are the best bacon sarnies I've ever had.' Another man said it was the first thing he'd eaten in 3 days. We were privileged to have the opportunity to chat to the residents whilst cooking. They thanked us for going, and we were asked when we would be back. It would be good to make this a monthly event. If anyone else can

offer their time, please let me know. It runs Wednesdays 12.00 pm – 2.00 pm.

At the time of writing, the future of the scheme is still unknown. It is hoped that another provider will take it on, as Midland Heart's contract is due to finish at the end of September. Please hold the staff and residents in your prayers at this uncertain time for all of them.

There are other opportunities to help as individuals. If you see someone homeless, please don't ignore them. Homeless people often feel faceless and not valued. A simple 'hello' and a quick word could make all the difference. You could offer a drink or some food if you feel comfortable enough to do so. If you are concerned about someone who is sleeping rough, you can contact Street Link on 0300 500 0914 or online https://thestreetlink.org.uk They will contact the local homeless services who will try to locate the person and put them in touch with groups who can provide support.

In Matthew 25 we hear the words 'When did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' The King will reply, 'I tell you, whenever you did this for one of the least important of these followers of mine, you did it for me!

The bags were dedicated at the Sept AAW before being distributed with the help of Pegasus Academy, Dudley. The Vice Principal at Pegasus



When I heard about the plans for this service and read the magazine article I thought 'well that's different!' I wondered how it would be supported and what form the service might take.

Just to recap, the service was to be centred around Tom Elliott who is a Christian comedian and magician who uses his skills to share his faith. Not for the first time I need not have worried.

The short ItL Praise Time before the main event was well supported and when the service itself started there was a larger number than usual in the congregation, but even more encouraging was the number of new faces - including children - who had been attracted by the publicity.





Tom's set started with some normal tricks as performed by the late great Paul Daniels which caused much astonishment and bafflement. (How did that lady's ring get inside the Kinder egg??)



He finished with a spectacular demonstration of levitation with 4 men lying backwards supported by well nothing!

The Feed My Sheep meals are for those who would otherwise normally eat alone on a Sunday. They are completely free.



The Not-so-Good Samaritan – Dave Walker

We never socialised much in our street. I've lived there nearly 40 years and, as far as I can remember, it's always been like that.

When the kids were small my husband and I both seemed too busy with work and family issues to cultivate any close friendship, or association of any sort really, with the rest of the people living alongside us.

Later on, the children moved out to pastures new and eventually we both retired. And, even then, we still didn't seem to have much contact with the neighbours. I guess it was the same for everyone else because this seemed to be the norm. We never popped round to see each other; and we never passed each other in the street and said 'good morning' because we all went everywhere in our cars. Living in a busy street you couldn't hear yourself speak, let alone start chatting.

When Frank died, I began to keep myself to myself even more. One day, however, I did manage to get out to the local library for a talk about home security by a very nice policewoman. She reminded everyone to remember to lock up properly every time every time we went out and told us never to leave our windows open, even if we were just going up the road to the shops. She said we should never make it widely known if we were going to be away for any length of time; we should never let in strangers, except by appointment; and we should always ask callers for proper identification. Furthermore, during the evening we should never open the door to any unexpected visitors, no matter what the circumstances.

A few days later, around 8.30 in the evening – just as the sun was going down over the back of our house – there was a loud knocking on my front door and some sort of cry for help. I didn't know what to do but, in the end, decided to sit tight and not answer the door, just as the policewoman had said.

The knocking stopped, then I heard the caller's footsteps carrying on along the pavement. A few seconds later the silence was broken by the noise of shouting and running, as what seemed like a gang of people came charging past my house

What on earth could have happened, I wondered?? The next day I found out.

Apparently, a badly beaten youth had been chased down our street and had knocked on several doors asking for help, without any success. Receiving no reply, he had carried on to the park where he had been caught by his pursuers and left bleeding from stab wounds under the children's slide.

He was found the following morning and taken to hospital but had sadly died a few hours later.

The news about his death was in the papers the next day and the story about his calls for help going unheeded by the residents of our street came out when the inquest was held.

Some people criticised us for not responding to the cries for help. Others felt, all things considered, we did the right thing otherwise we too might have become victims of the gang chasing him.

As for me, I thought we got it wrong. I feel we could – and should – have done more!



An autumnal recipe Judith Tyler

Carrot Parsnip and Orange Soup



Ingredients:

2 large carrots (approx 12 oz / 300 kg) – peeled and cut into chunks
2 large parsnips (approx 12 oz / 300 kg) – peeled and cut into chunks
1 medium onion – finely chopped
1 tbsp sunflower or olive oil
½ tsp ground ginger
500 ml (1 pint) vegetable or chicken stock
250ml (½pint) orange juice
Salt and pepper to taste

- 1. Heat the oil in a medium-sized saucepan. Gently fry the onion for a few minutes then add the prepared carrots and parsnips.
- 2. Stir in ground ginger, stock and orange juice. Bring to the boil, then turn down the heat and simmer for about 30 minutes, or until vegetables are tender.
- 3. Puree the soup using a food processor, liquidiser or hand blender. Add more stock if necessary, for the required consistency. Season to taste.
